With some 88 million color scans, this subscription site (about 219 USD per year) offers every important kind of Swedish genealogy record, as well as a growing collection of searchable indexes.

# Danish Demographic Database

Search censuses from 1787 and probate indexes for four counties, then follow the link to the invaluable Copenhagen Police Emigrant Protocols. (For the latter, select English from the language drop-down.)

This site from the National Archives of Norway is adding digitized records at a rapid clip, and now includes parish records, censuses, emigration lists, and land and probate papers. A global person search and "find source" options make it easy to research in records both indexed and otherwise.

The result of a state-ofthe-art digitization project by Germany's major Protestant denomination group, Archion makes millions of pages of church registers available to browse (with searching planned). Subscriptions start at about 23 USD per month.

#### **Genealogy Indexer**

Don't be put off by the plain exterior of this search engine for central and east European records. Inside you'll find 1.8 million pages in 3,240 historical directories; 159,000 pages of memorials of Jewish communities; 46,000 pages of community and personal histories; and more.

Cherchez your French families with digitized records, genealogical society indexes and in-depth guides to other resources (mostly available in English). A premium membership runs about 50 USD annually, but you can do beaucoup here for free.
