Dear Miriam:

As always, it was good to meet with you and I appreciate you forwarding me copies of your recent article about your genealogy tours in Poland published in "Chai Magazine."

I have just finished reading the cover story about you which appeared in "Metro-West Jewish News." It is obvious there is great interest and media coverage abut your "roots" tours to Eastern Europe and the archival access to on-site research which you have arranged in Poland and is now forthcoming in the USSR beginning in 1992.

With reference to your meetings with the Ukrainian State Archives in Lvov and Kiev, we are very interested in learning more about the type of material they intend to exhibit in conjunction with your visit.

In addition to the various types of documents which interest you and your tour participants as family historians, we would need to include various museum items of Judaica, such as posters and handbills with Jewish political, commercial, social and cultural content, anti-Semitica, period photographs, items from the daily lives of Jews living in the area such as textiles, tools, children's toys and books, kitchen implements, etc. In other words, two- and three-dimensional items which are visually interesting as well as historically significant.

When you meet with the Archives again next month, could you please ask them to prepare a list of the types of objects and materials which would form an exhibition. Would this material come solely from the archives or would this exhibition be in cooperation with museums throughout the Ukraine?

Provided it meets our criteria, we would be interested in bringing the exhibition to the United States and publishing a catalog in cooperation with the Archives.

Enclosed are catalogs, brochures and other publicity about the Museum of Jewish Heritage which we would appreciate you giving to the appropriate people in the Archives.

I look forward to meeting with you upon your return from the USSR in August.
